DISTRICT REAPPORTIONMENT



What is Reapportionment?

Reapportionment occurs every 10 years to ensure that each political district has been created equally using census data. The maps are drawn by a Reapportionment Commission who reviews the distribution of the population to attempt to ensure that citizens are equally represented. The district lines have changed significantly for Mililani and Mililani Mauka.

LEGISLATION PASSED IN THE 2022 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

The following bills were passed during the 2022 legislative session. For a full list of bills that passed, please visit RepMatsumoto.com.

AGRICULTURE & FARMING

GREEN JOBS

SB 2768: Establishes a Green Jobs Youth Corps to provide temporary work and training opportunities in the fields of natural resource management, agriculture, or other sustainability related professions to adults ages 38 and younger.

HOME GARDENS

HB 2280: Allows homeowners with an enclosed yard to grow plants for food even if the Homeowners Association has restrictions against it in their by-laws.

FOOD HUBS

SB 2218: Requires the Department of Agriculture to establish a 5 year food hub pilot program to increase access to local food.

COST OF LIVING

RETIREMENT SAVINGS

SB 3289: Establishes the Hawaii Retirement Savings Program to provide a state-facilitated, payroll-deduction, individual retirement savings plan for private sector employees who do not have access to employer-sponsored retirement savings plans.

MINIMUM WAGE

HB 2510: Raises the minimum wage in increments to; \$12 on Oct. 1, 2022, \$14 on Jan. 1, 2024, \$16.00 on Jan. 1, 2026, \$18 on Jan. 1, 2028. This bill also makes the earned income tax credit permanent and refundable.

TAXES

SB 514: Provides a tax refund of \$300 per person to the taxpayers of the State and makes deposits to the emergency and budget reserve fund and pension accumulation fund.

CRIME, REHABILITATION & PUBLIC SAFETY

FLAVORED TOBACCO

HB 1570: Bans the sale and distribution of all flavored tobacco products, including products with menthol, and prohibits the mislabeling of products as nicotine-free.

KEIKI CAR SAFETY

SB 152: Amends requirements for the restraint of child passengers. Requires a rear-facing child passenger restraint system with harness for children under two years of age.

DRIVER'S LICENSE

SB 2679: Extends the renewal period from two years to four years for licensees who are 72 years of age or older but younger than 80 years of age.

EDUCATION

DIGITAL LITERACY SB 2214: Establishes a digital literacy program to promote digital literacy via programmatic activities, including making digital technology accessible to those with disabilities.

PERIOD POVERTY SB 2821: Requires the Department of Education to provide menstrual products free of charge to all students on all public school campuses.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

SB 3091: Broadens the scope of profit-making operations students may engage in at schools to include commercial enterprises. Allows students to receive school credit, compensation, or both, when they engage in profit-making operations.

GOVERNMENT TRANSPARENCY

IMPEACHMENT

HB 1339: The House of Representatives shall have the power of impeachment of the Governor or Lieutenant Governor for malfeasance in office, corruption, dereliction of duty, or other high crimes or misdemeanors.

ETHICS

HB 1475: Requires state legislators and employees to complete mandatory ethics training courses every four years.

HB 2213 Relating to Mail Theft

A bill I introduced, HB 2213 Relating to Mail Theft, passed through the legislature. Mail and package theft have been an increasing issue in our state. HB2213 establishes the theft of mail to include packages left outside of residences and businesses from thirdparty carriers like UPS and FedEx, as a criminal offense.


HR 82 EIS Resolution


